Urban and Metropolitan students discover what makes the city tick – and the city is their classroom. They **examine** challenges and solutions by researching history, society, culture, economy, and politics in order to **understand** urban theory. They use that knowledge to get involved in their communities, giving them an outlet through which they can **experience** practical ways of solving complex problems faced by metropolitan regions. In the Urban and Metropolitan Studies program, they **learn** how to improve urban health and well-being, often **training** themselves to be the future leaders of our urban environments through studying the role of arts and culture, business and property development, revitalization and community building in the life of the region. Opportunities for UMS Barrett Students

Research. The College of Public Programs also commits substantial support to undergraduate research, as detailed at http://copp.asu.edu/do/students/undergrad-research. Specifically, COPP students working with COPP faculty for ten hours per week can earn \$500 in their first semester, \$750 in the second, and \$1000 in the third and subsequent semesters. This research experience can lead to ideas for independent study or thesis research.

Speakers/talks. SPA has a formal colloquium series that hosts speakers from around the country and ASU conducting research on Public Affairs. In addition, the school often hosts top scholars from around the world, and students are encouraged to attend their talks.

Public Service/Internships. There are multiple opportunities to serve as a bridge between students and the community and career world. Internships are part of the degree program, and students serve as interns in a variety of government, nonprofit, and private organizations. Service is very much an important part of SPA's culture, and there are multiple opportunities for students to become engaged with their community. Students interested in local government are encouraged to become active in the student chapter of the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) where they can network with local government officials as well as participate in service projects.

Honors Thesis/creative project expectations

In order for students to complete a thesis in the field of UMS, whether they major in UMS or not, they must have completed URB 300 Introduction to Urban and Metropolitan Studies. UMS honor students are encouraged to take a graduate level research course (PAF 501 Public Service Research I) as a substitute for PAF 301 or 401 Applied Statistics. Taking PAF 501 will earn students honors credit and help ensure they are prepared to engage in honors thesis-level research on a topic of relevance to the field.

The thesis project is developed with a faculty person who will help guide the student's research. SPA faculty are committed to helping students develop and complete their thesis projects. Projects range from formal research projects to policy white papers. Completing a thesis will help prepare students for graduate level research, and students who pursue a specific creative projects can receive experiences that will help prepare them for a variety of careers.
